Bill Payson and Mark Richardson, regular volunteers at the Col. Paul Wentworth House in Rollinsford, in militia and regimental





recent book, Portsmouth

Naval Prison, published in July 2016. Ms. Kramer, who lives in the area, did research for over 10 years to assemble the details in the book. The photographs are primarily from special collections, libraries and museums. Currently freelancing and teaching college composition, she has written features for magazines, university publications, and local newspapers.

The prison, on the end of Portsmouth Naval Shipyard on Seavey Island, opened in 1908 and was decommissioned in 1974. Known as "The Castle" or "The Rock" with its deceptively appealing exterior, it has long had a fearsome reputation. But it was also among the first to use the latest advancements in rehabilitation reform. We hope to see you on September 20!

The President's Letter

Friends.

Summer greetings! As you can see from this issue of the newsletter, the Historical Society has been a very busy place with more news to come in the fall.

A tentative date for the annual meeting of the membership has been set for November. Watch for a "save the date" and agenda in the fall. A Nominating Committee will be appointed in September to present a slate of officers and directors. As the Society's bylaws were last reviewed in 2004, the board felt it was important to evaluate them to ensure the document was in compliance with current state regulations for charitable organizations. A committee of Karen Ellis, Dick Chamberlain and Skip Belanger took on this important task. Lawyer and Historical Society member, Mark Tremallo, will be doing a final review. The committee will present the updated bylaws for a vote by the membership at the November annual meeting.

The interior of the building is also undergoing review and evaluation. It is owned by the town, and the board presented a request to the selectmen for work to bring the building into compliance with fire and safety regulations. As a result, the selectmen allocated up to \$10,000 toward the work and will be seeking bids for construction and electrical work.

This Spring, the Society purchased Quickbooks to efficiently keep our financial house in order. Many thanks to Jim Wiesman for completing our state and federal forms for 2017. The board also approved the purchase of PastPerfect museum software to catalog the collection. It will be easier to utilize the collection and do genealogical searches. This work will begin in the fall, with Curator Becky Davis overseeing the process.

If you happened to stop by during one of the three summer open houses, you would have seen the main meeting room in disarray while undergoing reorganization. Volunteers included Suzanne Austin, Karen and Nate Ellis, Heidi Dunham, Skip Belanger, Nick Wrighton, Robin Wrighton, Eric Klemarcyzk, Gary Farnham, Linda Rousseau, Alma Vahey, Frank Northrup, Bill Dunham, and Becky Davis. Some of the work done already includes: all the display cases are on casters, so the exhibit space can be rearranged; woodwork has been painted in the entrance; new curtains were installed on all the first floor windows: the textiles are inventoried and stored in acid-free boxes; photographs are collected and in the process of being labeled.

And, thanks to UNITIL, we now have new file cabinets in which to store files. (HINT HINT: We still need a new large desk in the office, so anyone with a desk to donate please contact me at the above email for specific details.)

As you can see, a lot has been accomplished so far this year. We are still proudly a pure volunteer-run organization. I hope that many of you will volunteer to help with the ongoing work of labeling photographs, developing new exhibits, helping with cataloging of the entire collection, and serving on a committee. We also need some help moving furniture, objects and artifacts to storage on the second floor. Volunteering can be as little as one or two hours – whatever and whenever works for you. Please contact me or a board member to arrange a time to volunteer.

And please - come and see the new exhibits. The 275th anniversary celebration, the salt cellars, and the Veasey powder horn, donated to the Society, are but three of the new exhibits. Again, thank you for joining the Society and for your interest in supporting Brentwood's history.
